Nature Notes June Edition [May notes 2023]

Well, the Swallows [Hirundo rustica] successfully returned in late April. They have taken advantage of the myriad of gnats and flies stacked over the garden. Joined in early May by House Martins [Delichon urbica] and they are all waging war on the food bounty. All the birds are looking for nesting sites, although most have taken up the most convenient locations. The Pheasant [Phasianus colchicus] is still 'shouting' loudly down in the valley, mainly in the afternoons on sunny days. Wood Pigeons [Columba palumbus] wobbling around the gardens, as clockwork toys, eating any seeds and pecking at greenery. Curved beaks ripping into soft leaves, watch out cabbage plants! Its soft cooing has a soothing and sleepy sound. A pair of collared doves have joined the queue for the seed feeders. Not that they actually perch on the feeders. They wait for any spoils other birds have disturbed or discarded. They are particularly shy birds flying off at the slightest movement or noise. The Wagtails seem to have left us, probably gone to the moors for the summer! Buzzards are taking to the thermals stacking high for observation. Just a few in competition for the 'high flyers' award!

Cheeky Sparrows amuse with their antics. They have learnt how to hover by the greenhouse searching for spiders or insects along the frames. When crumbs from breakfast are thrown out on to the grass they ae already waiting in the foliage to fly down for a quick meal before the Rooks get there to clean up. Gangs of Sparrows search for every crumb in the grass. They take any larger sized morsel to hide



in the Clematis to eat it before another bird steals the tasty titbit from them. Disputes are noisy affairs with much flying and protesting. This is often when a Sparrow will fly into a pane of the conservatory. Falling down to the ground to wait until the headache had cleared, then they fly back to the protection of the foliage protesting loudly, or simply to let the others know that they were still 'active, despite the mishap.

Several pairs or 'teams' of butterflies visited the garden: Whites, Admirals, and Tortoiseshells in particular. A joy to see them alight on a flower head and unroll their tongue to insert into the nectar bearing flower. Having refuelled they are off to catch up with the rest of the 'team'. There has been a rush of Buddleia flowering as the weather improved. Good food plants for both butterflies and bees.

Many Bumble bees have been very busy on the comfrey flowers. Sitting quietly, one senses the garden is alive with their buzzing. Mid-May many honey bees visited the garden and a number visited the house. As they were still slow flying, it was easy to manoeuvre them out of a window. These dark workers intent on collecting pollen or nectar made no protest at being helped onward to find their particular choice of flowers.



On moving containers and pots uncovered colonies of woodlice and a few small worms amongst the washed-out silt from the vessels. Not sure whether the visiting hedgehog eats woodlice when on its rounds through the garden. If it could raise the plant containers, it would find a take-away of vast numbers of snacks. Snail numbers are still high despite the Hedgehog's appetite. In fact with the drier weather, the snails have started to climb up the trunks of bushes and trees and seal themselves in to await wet weather again.

Ants are on the move ferrying aphids around the crab apple. This has finished flowering and now the ants are herding aphids onto the tips of the apple-bearing extremities. Here the new growth is soft and sweet, just what the aphids like. Fortunately, the Blue Tits waiting to feed from the seed feeders, search out aphids from these twisted leaves as a starter to their main course.

Garden Notes June 2023

Summer solstice this month, then daylight hours begin to shorten!

Research by the RHS, Vitacress Herbs and Royal Holloway, University of London has shown that the addition of mycorrhizal fungi to growing media leads to increased production of essential oils in rosemary, making the herb more aromatic and flavoursome. Mycorrhiza are beneficial fungi widely available commercially to gardeners. The study showed that the fungi didn't alter plant shape or structure, just the production of compounds that enhance taste. This effect could be used by trade growers to grow rosemary plants with the potential for extra flavour. Although exact research conditions cannot be replicated at home, curious gardeners might want to try adding the fungi to their rosemary plants.

[This is very interesting as rosemary in the garden, over the last five or six years, has had to be treated as a short-lived plant. It has been grown in pots, and various soil locations around the garden. Each time the plant has died, despite every effort to keep it alive. Changing the soil from acidic to alkaline has not had much positive effect either.]

How about a bit of work in the garden for June?

- ➤ Water, from the water butt, when necessary
- ➤ Keep control of the weeds, hoe, hoe, hoe when the weather is dry & sunny.
- ➤ Watch out for pests & diseases, taking appropriate action.
- Finish planting out tender annuals & perennials
- Are your baskets & containers ready to go out?
- > Fill gaps among perennials
- > Clear away spring annuals such as forget-me-nots
- ➤ Sow biennials [Sweet Williams, wallflowers etc]
- When the foliage of spring bulbs has died back, remove.
- ➤ Plant autumn-flowering bulbs
- ➤ Have you spread a mulch or cardboard under strawberry foliage. This is to prevent splash back of soil to stop mildew on leaves & fruit.
- ➤ Tie in new blackberry, raspberry & loganberry canes
- ➤ Thin tree fruit if necessary. The 'June drop' may happen automatically as the tree tries to lessen the amount of fruit it is carrying!
- ➤ Pinch out shoots & tie in wall-trained fruit
- ➤ Is the greenhouse adequately ventilated, & shaded?
- ➤ Dampen down the floor to raise humidity & cool the greenhouse
- > Try not to splash water on the leaves as this can cause scorching & give rise to mildew
- Mow regularly, but not too closely or too frequently if the weather is hot & dry
- In the perennial beds check that plants that need supporting are supported
- Deadhead flowers to encourage more flowers
- > Pot on spring sown perennials.
- > Fill unexpected gaps with annuals
- Your mulching, using all that great compost made last season will have slowed down moisture loss. But, if necessary, water from the water butt, then cover with mulch.
- > Deadhead spring flowering shrubs, then prune to shape
- Remove suckers, cut along the root junction not just at soil level
- ➤ Lightly trim hedges
- ➤ Continue successional sowing of vegetables.
- > Plant out autumn & winter brassicas



SCAM SPOTTING GUIDE

Nearly a third of ALL fraud is committed over the telephone.

Criminals can impersonate your bank, the Police, Tax Office, Investment or Software companies and other trusted organisations. They will try to convince you to part with your money.

Hang up on all cold calls from any business or authority. Then "Take 5" to check it out as genuine via a trusted source.

The three most common scams are:-

- 1 Your computer has a problem
- 2 A fraud investigation
- 3 An investment opportunity

Out of the blue – no thank you!

Criminals can disguise their phone number to look like its from a bank, police etc.

They can call you from what looks like a genuine phone number.

They will keep your landline open by not hanging up or even play a dialling tone.

They can text messages asking you to call them or to click on a link.

Most of these calls do not come from UK centres but from massive fraud units abroad. The caller will frequently be aggressive if you do not comply with their instructions. Many are initially automated calls, giving you erroneous information and asking you to press a key on your phonepad to speak to someone. At that stage, you will be speaking to a FRAUDSTER. They will tell you to install software on your phone or computer, which will then allow the device to be controlled by the fraudsters. NEVER install such software as a result of a cold call, however confused the caller may make you.

They appear to target the more elderly amongst us! If you are unsure, just hang up. They can be very persistent.

PHONE SCAMS

5 THINGS TO LOOK OUT FOR ON A SCAM PHONE CALL

- The caller doesn't give you time to think, tries to stop you speaking to a family member or friend or is insistent and makes you feel uncomfortable.
- 2. The caller asks you to transfer money to a new account.
- **3.** They phone to ask for your 4-digit card PIN or your online banking password. Even if they ask you to give it to them by tapping into the telephone keypad rather than saying the numbers out loud, this is a scam.
- **4.** They ask you to withdraw money to hand over to them for safe-keeping.
- **5.** They may say that you are a victim of fraud and offer to send a courier to your home to collect your cash, PIN, payment card or cheque book.
