Parish Council

River Discharges – the Parish Council voiced concerns over river discharges in the Diptford Area. The Area is used for wild swimming, fishing, and other water activities. The Parish Council are writing to South West Water to see what can be done about these river discharges, so that the local waters can be enjoyed safely by all.

Potholes – there are currently a large number of potholes in the parish roads. This issue is to be raised with Devon County Council as to when repairs will be carried out. Everyone can help with this, by reporting potholes to Devon County Council on dedicated website page.

Litter – there has been an increase in the litter on the road verges. The Parish Council will be monitoring this and ask parishioners to pick up litter and dispose of it where possible to keep our Parish looking nice.

School building works – the new classrooms are progressing and disruptions to the village are being kept to a minimum.

Graveyard – the Parish Council have been contacted with regards to the need for paths to be mowed in the graveyard to help with access to visit graves. We have been advised that paths are now to be mowed.

Village planters – the Parish Council thanks Beverley Sudgen and the others who have worked hard planting out the village planters which are all now looking blooming.

July 2023 {June 2023 Nature Notes]

How surprising can Nature be? For many, many years we have driven around the district at all times of the day and night, never seeing a 'local' deer. Then, one afternoon about three o'clock driving back from Totnes past Beneknowle a Roe deer Hind steps from the river side of the of the road, pauses to watch just what the ca will do, then slowly climbs the bank through all the vegetation. One of those 'did we, or did we not just see that'? Three young Squirrels have hopped across the field to try to find a way to 'raid' the bird feeders. Then a few days later a much larger grey squirrel appeared attacking the feeders. It was not going to be put off by hand claps, whistles or bangs. Finally, when a stone was lobbed towards it, the brazen creature decided to leave. The birds then came down to continue eating

the fat balls. Saw a Goldfinch eating Lemon Queen plant. Perhaps it was the very light showers of rain the covered in aphids. Ants were seen of the plants. They caress these encourage them to emit excess also protect herds of aphids from



or rather pecking at the tips of the eating the aphids? Incidentally, after rose buds and shoot tips were carrying these 'cows' to fresher parts insects with their antennae to sugary fluid for the ants to eat. Ants their predators; Lady Birds, and their

larvae, lace wings and beetles. An interesting symbiotic relationship. Snails have been picked off the trunks and boughs of fruit trees prior to the 'rain'. Thrown into the field for the rooks! They must have climbed up to get away from the dry conditions, or from the impending flood!

The Rooks have done an excellent job, searching the grass for the small garden chafers. These small insects came up from the grass where they have lived for a year as larvae, to eat pollen, fly and mate to complete the cycle. Numerous Rooks have taken advantage of an easy meal. They Chafers have been out and about for about a very dry and warm week. This occurred last year and the year before, roughly the first or second week in June. Dull brown bodies with bright green iridescent heads. Legs will cling onto, hair, clothes, or washing. This is a real danger when ironing and they have not been spotted hiding in the folds!

The starling families have multiplied considerably. The young in their immature drab garments squabbling over absolutely everything; food, water, space or adults' attention. They all take off as a noisy flock, flying 'follow the leader'. Up into the sky or towards leafy cover! Sparrow numbers have increased, but they are far more reserved in their movements. Three Wood Pigeons have taken to enjoying the bird bath. Because they are all so similar in dress it is difficult to tell which are male and which are female, or young from mature! Buzzards flying on rising thermals release a plaintive mew to encourage the young to join them on a high view flying trip. Blue Tits have shown no interest in the Bird nesting box. Perhaps it is not a fashionable colour being just wood! Or it is too obvious for the Magpies to see any activity and plot their take-away meals! The wise small birds have avoided the nest box being aware of the possible fate that awaits! The Pheasant calling out early morning and late evening, a regular alarm clock! Woodpecker drumming on a hollow bough in the valley. Great to sit in the evening sunshine and listen to the Swallows screeching across the sky. Not so many as last year but numbers seem to be increasing.

Hedgehog has been visiting but not as regularly as earlier in the year. Perhaps they have found it too dry for slugs and snails to be out at night? These molluscs still attacking fleshy plant leaves and stalks, toppling lupin stems like lumberjacks! Flowers have found their niche. Lasting for an allotted period of time and then gone. The season is going by so rapidly! But enjoy it whilst there.

July 2023

How has the garden survived the June 2023 drought? Hose watering ban and much effort carrying gallons of water has been frustrating but 'essential'! Has there been a sudden rush of flowers and vegetables? Keep picking to encourage and prolong the succession of flowers, fruit and vegetables. Excess produce can always be given away to friends and neighbours, as such gifts are always welcome. The middle of the year has gone by, almost unexpected.

How about a bit of work for the month?

- Keep control of those pests & weeds. Treat as necessary.
- Watch out for disease
- Use late-sown annuals to fill gaps
- Hanging baskets & containers require much water & feed
- Deadhead regularly & cut back straggly plants
- Plant autumn-flowering bulbs
- Order next year's bulbs!
- Pick soft fruit as it ripens, for freezing, or jams, or even bottling.
- Have you tried thinning tree fruit to leave a few but potentially bigger fruit?
- Remove 'canes' that have finished fruiting, then tie in new canes.
- Cut of 'tired' leaves & remove mulch from strawberries that have finished fruiting.
- Summer prune soft fruit
- Make sure the Greenhouse is adequately shaded, ventilated, & dampened down. This is especially necessary in hot weather to it cool & humid.
- Are you pinching out & tieing in the tomatoes, & cucumbers?
- Water at least once a day, preferably early morning or late evening!
- If the greenhouse is not in use for growing crops then thoroughly clean & disinfect it.
- When the weather is dry try raising the mowing height & mow less frequently. If mowing is just tipping-off the grass then leave the cuttings to rot down on the grass to provide a mulch.
- If the weather conditions are suitable give a light application of fertilizer, the grass will delight in a feed!
- Have you tried taking cuttings [Pipings] of Carnations or Pinks?
- Cut plants such as oriental poppies to the ground when flowering is over & leaves turn brown.
- Keep beds weed free, & apply a mulch once the ground is wet [after rain!].
- Check that ties & stakes are loose, you don't want to strangle the trees or shrubs.
- Plant container-grown trees & shrubs. Keep well-watered.
- After flowering, prune shrubs that flower on old wood.
- Lightly cut hedges, especially if the overhang public paths & walkways. Lightly trim topiary!
- Make last successional sowings of vegetables & salad crops.
- Lift & dry onions & shallots as the leaves dry back.
- Harvest & dry vegetables as they are ready.
- Keep beds weed free. Have you thought about sowing a 'green' manure winter crop?
- Have you started digging up potatoes for 'dry' storage?

PEEP AT THE PAST

TOTNES TIMES 1 JUNE 2023 100 years ago

By kind permission of Mr Ken Prout and the Editor of the Totnes Times

"At the Castle Hotel, Totnes on Friday, Messrs Rendell and Sawdye disposed of three South Devon farms by auction. There was a large attendance. On behalf of Mr J Codd, Lower Larcombe, Diptford. 44a Or 9p with stone and slated house and buildings was submitted, possession to be given at Michaelmas. The tithe is £7.4s and land tax 9.5d in the £. The opening bid was £1,500 and Mr J Raymont, East Moor, Harberton became the owner at £2,400. W Beer (Kingsbridge) were the solicitors named"

For more local interest – Mr J Raymont was the father of Eva (of Lower Larcombe) who married William Stone from East Prawle. Eva was the sister of Daisy who married into the Steer family. Eva remained at Lower Larcombe until her death, and was survived by Bill who was a legend in the area, passing away at the age of almost 102.

WILLIAM RICHARD STONE Tribute by Rev Peter Willis at the time of Bill's death

13 November 1904 – 22 April 2006

So William, our oldest Parishioner, has completed his life here on earth. I wonder if you all know that he was not born here but walked in from the coast, driving his parents' stock, aged 18. His parents were moving to Thorn Farm. Later he was to meet Eva, marry in 1935, and to live and farm at Lower Larcombe. Some fifty nine years ago, Les Weekes came from Torbay to become one of the family. Les was eleven years old. So Bill and Eva became Auntie and Uncle all of their lives and, as for Les, he was more than a son to them. Eva died some twenty one years ago. Les then became the person to run the household, aided when possible by Mrs Mary Daniels, and also to take over the complete responsibility for farming and producing the vegetables for the weekly Friday market in Totnes. This was as Bill lost his sight.

I have known Bill for some 35 years and, as so many of you know, he was a 'real character'. You could say he was eccentric in many ways and had a wry sense of fun and humour. He laughed with you and laughed much at himself. His was always Open House, and he especially enjoyed entertaining the hunt, when the whisky especially flowed like water. I have known him to offer me a whisky before 10am on many occasions! He was certainly what is nowadays called 'old fashioned' which is a compliment. He enjoyed a joke and always said first of all when we met "You haven't got me yet, Rector". I always said "I didn't want him, and could he think of anything good about him if the occasion occurred?" He would laugh. I never saw Bill make a cup of tea or do any cooking. He was also well known for not being very mechanical. There was the instance when he turned the tractor over on to himself, and I well remember going into the operating theatre with unconscious Bill. He was in hospital for several weeks.

Many of us will really miss 'old Bill' and it is a pity that there are not many country folk like him left. "
