

June 2024 Gardening Notes

Look out for these friendly 'bugs':

- 1) Violet Ground beetle [Carabus violaceous] often found under logs, this 3cm-long predator is one of the biggest and more colourful of the 300 ground beetle species in Britain. They're mainly active at night and their prey includes; slugs, caterpillars and other beetles.
- 2) Seven spot Ladybird [Coccinella septempunctata] at about 1cm long this is one of the largest of the 46 species of ladybird found in Britain. The adults and grey larvae can be seen feeding voraciously on greenfly and other aphids.
- 3) Wasp spider [Argiope bruennichi] Sitting in the centre of its 30cm-wide web, the 2cm-long female wasp spider is an impressive harmless wasp mimic, and the largest orb web spider in Britain. The male is smaller at 0.5cm.

One of the best months to be working in the garden. The air is warm and the ground firm but, with luck still with moisture, especially if you have put down mulch when the ground was really wet! No danger of frost now, but drying out in the wind and sun. You may need to water plants!

How about a bit more work in the garden?

- ➤ Control those weeds, hoe, hoe! Weed seeds are germinating and hoeing will allow the sun to dry them out.
- ➤ Watch out for pests & diseases & take appropriate action. Beware the red lily beetle.
- Finish planting out tender annuals & perennials.
- Are your baskets & containers ready to go outside?
- ➤ Clear away spring annuals, such as Forget-me-not. Space for summer annuals!
- Sow biennials [Wallflowers, might need a handful of lime per square yard!]
- > Plant autumn- flowering bulbs.
- Are you picking strawberries? Net all soft fruit against birds. They always get there first!
- ➤ Make sure the greenhouse is adequately shaded & ventilated. Damp down the floor in the morning or evening to keep air cool & humidity high. Feed plants weekly.
- Mow the lawn regularly but not too close or too frequently if the weather is dry.
- > Deadhead flowers as they go over. This will encourage more buds.
- > Check that all plants needing support are supported. But you've done that earlier.
- ➤ Deadhead spring flowering shrubs, & lightly prune them.
- ➤ Cut hedges lightly, especially those growing over paths. {Watch out for the birds}
- Plant out tender vegetables, if you have not done so already.
- ➤ Plant out autumn & winter brassicas, if you have not done so already!
- > Plant out leeks & water in thoroughly.
- Are you eating those early potatoes? Great with a salad!
- ➤ Given up on planting outdoor tomatoes as they always seem to get blight [brown splodges on the leaves & fruit leaving them misshapen.
- A compound fertiliser, watered in, for the perennials, shrubs & borders.
- > Plant container-grown trees & shrubs, water them in well.
- ➤ Shear over aubretia & alyssum when they have finished blooming to keep them in shape.
- ➤ Keep picking sweet peas & young beans to encourage more flowers. It is said this works!

- ➤ Watch out for evidence of the Fuchsia gall midge, it leaves the tips of the shoots in a mutant mess. Cut off these ruined shoots & burn them immediately. The midge will have long gone but there will probably be eggs & nymphs among the leaves.
- ➤ Valiantly trying to reduce work in the garden by covering all the soil with plants, & growing climbing plants especially in the vegetable beds. It's easier to pick standing up.

Nature notes May 2024

May has been splendid this year, especially the Bluebells. Lane hedges have been a picture of bluebells, pink Campion and White milkmaids. Almost draped with union jacks! Dandelions have had an extended flowering this year. Masses of 'clocks' releasing seeds in the wind. How has the pollen from flowers and trees been for hay-fever sufferers? Grass has grown rapidly, as if trying to make the year catch up from the delayed start. Noticed the tree green budding s magnificenwas earlier towards Newton Abbot and Plymouth than around Diptford. The cooling effect of the proximity of the moors making a big influence. May blossom [or hawthorn] certainly covered the trees in white blankets, following the earlier sheets of sloe blossom! Wild Cherries flow apples ered and dropped early in May. Ash buds slow to break, well after the Khaki shoots of Oak had displayed. What effect will that have on the weather? Masses of white Horse Chestnut Candles and they have grown impressively. It should be an excellent conker year this year! Will there be good competitions? Or it is a game of the past? New leaves, so far, are not showing signs of the disease that blighted the trees in past years. Even the Sycamores are not showing that 'oil-tar' spot on the leaves, yet!

The Pink-flowering Crab Apple [Harry Baker] is magnificent again this year. If the weather is kind, and flies and bees active, there should be lots of fruit this year. The apple trees seem to be flowering well, so there is hope for a bumper harvest again later in the autumn.

Noticed the busy Blackbirds pecking up worms and other tasty morsels then taking straight back to their nest. Either the female is sitting tight or the eggs have hatched already. Several times they have swapped over and the female has been out feeding so it looks like the eggs have not hatched yet!

Sparrows are noticeable by a minimal presence! Seen Goldfinches on the seed feeder. Wrens 'shouting' their presence whist collecting food along the low moss-covered walls. Chorus of Wood Pigeons from early morning, first light to dusk announcing their territory and mates, then down to pick up the seed knocked out of the feeders by the skirmishing activity of the Rooks, and small birds.

Heard and saw Swallows and House Martins criss-crossing the sky in the last week of April. Even more arriving during the first week of May. Not sure if this is later or earlier than usual!

Watched the fields the other side of the river being ploughed. The tractor left a following trail of Seagulls and Rooks behind, as it slowly changed the land from green to brown on its way across the steep field. More and more birds joined in the take-away feast during the day. They spread out as a black and white chequer-pattern cloud, like a cloth covering the field table-top.

The garden has regularly been visited by hedgehogs. There must have been family groups, as their 'calling cards' were of different sizes and shapes. However, the good was done by their nocturnal visits as the end evidence showed! Snails and slug trails abruptly ended as the creatures were removed! It would be nice to hear the 'anvil tapping' during the day to show that Thrushes were keeping up the assault to reduce the marauding molluscs numbers, leaving shoots and seedlings to grow unharmed!

In the pond small newt fry are numerous, frogs and toads bathing, and hopefully coming out of the water to search for food on the surrounding soil. More slugs and snails to disappear from the area!

Many bumble bees, solitary bees and honey bees making the most of the nectar flow induced by the warmer weather and sunshine. The apple, pear and plum blossom might have a chance to be pollenated. Even flies can help as they pass from flower to flower with pollen on their feet. The only difficulty might be if the winds are drying out the pollen so it is not 'sticky' enough to attach to the next flower as all these insects move around.

Prudent financial management leads to real benefits

Earlier this week councillors agreed a £12 million boost to pothole repairs and preemptive road drainage work after hearing that our overall budget for 2023/24 has come in underspent.

We've been working hard to strengthen our financial sustainability and resilience by living within our means, and have managed to make significant savings resulting in an underspend of £5.2 million last financial year.

This, coupled with a better-than-expected settlement with the Government to reduce our deficit on special needs education, has allowed for the new multi-million pound investment to improve the condition of our roads and tackle the large backlog of repairs.

Household Support Fund

If you're struggling with day to day living costs such as food, energy costs or essential household items, help is at hand from South Hams District Council's Household Support Fund.

New funds totalling £162,926 are now available for those most in need. With limited finances available, we will prioritise residents with the lowest incomes first.

The scheme offers one-off financial payments, or other support, within a six-month period. This support could be buying food, paying bills or help to buy household goods. We recognise we can't predict every challenge that residents may face, so we will be accepting applications for other essential types of support which can't be budgeted for that deliver the aims of this scheme. Important updates

This latest edition of Roadmap focusses on the latest data on Highway tree safety, hedge and grass cutting, and the spread of Ash dieback within the county.

Devon County Council and Devon Highways have worked tirelessly to mitigate the risks posed by trees and overgrown vegetation in our County. We trust this information will help residents make informed choices of their responsibilities, cyclical works and the need to keep the Highway safe for road traffic users.

Landowners and occupiers are required by law to properly maintain their trees and vegetation bordering the highway.



Landowners are advised to regularly check the health of their trees and take action where appropriate.

Landowners should ensure that their trees and vegetation do not reduce visibility on the highway and that all highway users can pass safely.

Streetlights and road signs should also be clearly visible.

Please encourage your community to consider the timing of their routine tree and hedge maintenance and consider both the need to protect highway users from hazards and to protect the environment.

Additional guidance for landowners is available on our website.

English hedgerows will be further protected in law but maintenance to protect highway users will be permitted.

<u>The legislation</u> will include a two metre 'buffer strip' from the centre of hedgerows with no cultivation or application of pesticides or fertilisers, and a hedge cutting ban between 1 March and 31 August to protect nesting birds.

Cutting or trimming during the cutting ban period is permitted

- if the hedgerow overhangs a highway, road or footpath over which there is a public or private right of way and it obstructs the passage of, or is a danger to, vehicles, or users
- if the hedgerow is dead, diseased, damaged or insecurely rooted and because of its condition, it or
 part of it, is likely to cause danger by falling on to a highway, road or footpath

Maintaining highway verges

During 'No Mow May' we would like to highlight that we only carry out grass-cutting on highway verges in areas that are key to maintaining visibility, such as at junctions, laybys, and the inside of bends.

Our aim when grass-cutting is to keep the highway safe and to maintain visibility for all road users.



The Parish Paths Partnership (P3)

The Parish Paths Partnerships Scheme (also known as the P3 scheme) is an initiative to ensure that the rights of way network is properly maintained and well publicised. It has the support of the National Association of Local Councils and is Devon County Council funded. The County Council was one of the first 15 Highway Authorities to participate in this scheme, which encourages community involvement and enjoyment of public rights of way. Devon County Council is working in partnership with parish/town councils, landowners and local voluntary groups. The main aim is to improve the condition of the local rights of way and keep them open and used properly.
