Strange weather as we seem to have had adequate rainfall since Christmas, but BBC weather report gave Roadford Lake as only 65 % full and several other lakes only just about 50%. Generally, the South West water holding nowhere as near to the expected 85%. Far more needed to ensure readiness for the summer use. In fact, there are still hosepipe bans reported in north Devon and parts of Cornwall.

The River Avon has risen to a high state on several occasions, with peat-stained water rushing past, bank full. Any early low-nesting birds will probably have nests and eggs washed downstream already. The rook colonies around the village are nesting as high as they can. Surely, they know a thing or two about the wind and rain? House Sparrows have become more and more noisy in their 'preparations' for nesting! A lot of chasing around the garden and flying headlong into the shrubbery cover! Blue Tits are extremely active, although none appear to have investigated the 'new' nest box yet.

A Fieldmouse has made good use of the peanut rack by the pear tree. It has been running from ground level up the support to the container and back again so many times it must have been dizzy. Does this mean there are young around? For such a small creature it certainly is amazingly agile and active. Pretty little animal, but very vulnerable.





Have seen skeins of Geese flying down river honking their way towards Turtly Mill Lake. Hope they are good customers! Especially if food is deliberately left out for them! They make an impressive display on their travels. Originally these were ornamental and introduced on various ponds and lakes. Now their numbers have increased and they have become quite wild, being considered having resident status. All this in less than one hundred years.

The visiting hedgehog has left a calling card for a number of consecutive nights! With luck it is making inroads into the snail and slug population and dining on earthworms too. At least we have a regular active visitor to the back garden. Hopefully, the sleeping arrangements are to its liking and it will be encouraged to stay for a while. It may even decide to invest more than just time in the garden!





We are in need of biological control of the Lily Beetles that seem to have had a particularly easy winter, as there are massive numbers on the Lilies.

They festoon the Lily Leaves and are so easy to spot being such a bright colour. Left alone they will quickly decimate the Lily leaves and flower buds. If you try to gently take them off the leaves they drop off at the slightest movement and go to ground. The only way is to spray them, to reduce their numbers. But they will be back later in July and next year.

There is activity in the pond at last. Two 'black' goldfish have come through winter. They are feeding well and competing well. No spawn is apparent, at the moment! Insect life on the pond's surface is increasing rapidly: skaters, boatmen and others flit across the surface to investigate any movement. Future looks bright, and the water is so clear. Will have to remove some of the weed to make space for all the activity.

Garden Notes May 2023

Have you managed to sow anything in the vegetable beds yet? Don't worry or be lulled into a false sense of security. Nature is quite capable of delivering a neat blow below the belt. Frosts can suddenly appear at any time this month when least expected, especially in the early first half of the month. Be prepared to cover those young shoots of tender plants with newspaper, hessian sacking or fleece.

Weeding should of course be carried out throughout the year, but remember weeds are growing at their fastest around now. Ephemeral weeds, those that germinate, grow, and seed several times in a year are very active now. One year seeding gives seven years weeding! Hoe when dry and sunny, even if you cannot see germinating weed seed. The wind and sun will desiccate the seed before it sends out shoots if you disturb the soil around them. When weeding wear gloves as there a bound to be stinging nettle shoots hiding amongst other weed shoots just waiting to give you a nasty 'nip'. Although small the stinging power is there!

Are you ready, planned for the season? How about a bit of work then?

- Watch out for pests, disease and take appropriate action, sooner rather than later.
- Harden off tender annuals in protection.
- Plant out tender annuals & perennials once frosts are over.
- Harden off hanging baskets & containers.
- Support annual climbers & perennials so plants can grow through the supports.
- Plant out dahlias after frosts are over.
- Cut grass around naturalized bulbs once foliage dies down.
- Continue to mow lawns regularly, slowly reducing height cut.
- Apply selective feed and weed and moss killer.
- Apply nitrogenous feed later in the month.
- Prune and tie in fan trained fruit trees.
- Place a straw mulch under strawberry foliage.
- Allow plenty of ventilation in the greenhouse.
- IT may be necessary to apply shade to the greenhouse.
- Water at least twice daily, in early morning and late evening.
- Keep on potting up and hardening off annuals.
- Control pests and disease if necessary before it becomes a problem.
- Prune shrubs that have flowered in early spring.
- Clip hedges if necessary.
- Take soft wood cuttings.
- Tie in new growth.
- Continual successional sowings of hardy vegetables, little and often.
- Plant out pre-sown vegetables, after last frosts.
- Have you earthed up early potatoes?
- Sow biennials [wallflowers and sweet Williams].

Kew fells 1,000 ash trees to beat disease: The Royal botanic Garden Kew has been forced to temporarily close a 150-acre nature reserve at its Wakehurst site while it fells as many as 1,000 trees to combat ash dieback. The closure of the reserve, in the Loder Valley, follows research that found more than 90% of its ash trees were affected by the fungal pathogen, Hymenoscyphus fraxineus, which leads trees to suffer leaf loss and crown dieback. It's hoped the felling will prevent the disease from spreading further, while Kew scientists study the genetic make-up of more resilient species to find a long-term solution.

LOCAL ELECTIONS MAY 2023

You may have heard about important changes taking place in the upcoming local elections. This year they are being held on Thursday 4 May, for all wards in South Hams. Voter ID

The main difference for voters is that you will have to show photo ID when voting at a polling station - postal votes are unaffected.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote?

You can use any of the following:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional licence)
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric Immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can <u>apply for a free voter ID document</u>, known as a **Voter Authority Certificate**.
